

#### Using Up Scraps #7 with Vikki MacDonald

#### **Graph Paper Quilt**




On a piece of graph paper frame out the size of quilt you wish to make. Let one square on the graph paper equal 2", which will be the finished size of the squares in the quilt. You will cut them at 2½". On your graph paper fill in the shapes with squares and rectangles, e.g. 4 x 4, 3 x 9, 2 x 6, 1 x 7, etc., leaving only 2" or 4" between shapes.



#### **Uneven Strip Quilt**



- Determine the width of the guilt you wish to make.
- · Use 2.5" wide strips of various lengths.
- Cut two 2.5" squares off to reserve for the side borders.
- To construct one strip first measure it and then add background colour strips of equal or unequal length to each end, remembering that you will be adding the 2½" squares on each end
- · Construct enough strips in this manner until you have enough for the length of your quilt.
- Enjoy arranging them.

#### WCQG QUILT EXHIBIT 2017

We are looking for all kinds of quilts to be shown at our Quilt Exhibit on October 13-14, 2017. Just about any quilt project will fit into one of these categories:

- Small wall quilt maximum perimeter 180 inches (no minimum)
- Large wall quilt perimeter greater than 180 inches
- Modern quilt
- Bed or lap quilt
- Other items i.e., quilted jacket, quilted carrying bag
- Group quilt
- Small draw quilt these small quilts are used as draw prizes and will not be returned to you
- President's Challenge quilt

You may submit a maximum of six entries into the quilt exhibit in addition to the President's Challenge.

Please look at the WCQG website under Quilt Exhibit to see the revised instructions when making a quilt sleeve.

#### PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE

For this year's President's Challenge, Eileen has chosen the theme of a song title or a line from a song.

The size of the finished quilt should be 12 1/2" by 12 1/2" (the size of a record album!)

You may interpret the song title or line as you wish. Be creative. Will we be able to identify your song?

Your entry must have a sleeve and a label with your name, the name of the quilt, and the category (2017 President's Challenge.)

The challenge quilts must be finished and shown at the June 2017 guild meeting. All other quilt entries must be completed and ready to be photographed in the summer of 2017. Exact dates are yet to be determined.

We will also be looking for a variety of sewn or quilted items to sell at our **Boutique** during the exhibit.

#### The Continuing Trials of Kathy and Eileen:

It was our first day of filming. We drove to the St. George base camp (aka corn field) with trailers for makeup and putting on costumes. A man greeted us with, "Who are you?" "The quilters" we said. People seem to know us as 'the quilters'. We were shuttled to the film site, a goat farmhouse with much of the inside gutted and wallpapered. We were to be there for 11am, but they didn't end up needing us until 3pm.

The excitement began. There was our quilt...on a table... in the pillowcase we'd made for it...IN A PLASTIC BAG...IN THE SUN. We ran over and pulled out the quilt, luckily it was only slightly damp. We sat nearby as they brought over the quilt, then laid it on a table. The director grabbed his walkie talkie, "We need lint rollers! Every one we have!" Geez, I only have two cats. I had tried to get it out but my lint remover just lined up the fibres and cat hairs into neat little rows. The batting had been a bit too small so we had to whip stitch more on and then sew the border and binding. (If you remember my last writing, we had to redo the border when the powers that be changed their minds, thus the lint).

The actress (Sarah Gaden) wanted the quilt spread out around her and on her lap. They wanted her to insert three

triangles into the centre. "No," we said, "how about doing a feather-stitch around the triangles?" They went on a break so I took a little walk to the food trailer. Upon returning, I found Eileen trying to remember how to do a feather stitch. I was trying to remember, too. We managed a sad buttonhole stitch instead and it worked. (Feather stitching will come later.)

When filming a period feature, the look is dingy, so they used some type of dirt stick to "age" the three triangles. I removed some stitches from the snake head so Sarah could pretend to be appliquing it. They dragged the quilt over walnut shells, in high grass, and yelled to hurry and sew the head back on so they could hang the quilt on the line...the dirty line...with rusty pegs. After many different shots were taken, the "quilt technicians" called it a wrap.

Next up... the acting debut of my hands.  $\mathcal{K}athy\ \mathcal{L}angill$


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# EARLY CALL FOR ARTISTS HIDDEN VALLEY REVEALED
