To start the celebration of our 25th anniversary we are pleased to announce that we have John Willard as our guest speaker for September. His lecture is titled, "Portrait of an Artist as Quiltmaker".

John, a self-taught quiltmaker, was born in New Brunswick but now lives in Burlington, Ontario. He came to quiltmaking via theatre and costume design, photography, display and collecting. He made his first quilt in 1975 after amassing a sizeable collection of antique quilts. Although his first quilts were very traditional, he soon branched out into his own designs which have evolved into bravura works of intense colour and complex pattern. He is especially noted for his daring combinations of varying and disparate fabric prints. He also teaches the art of the quilt, specializing in contemporary design for those who wish to break away from traditional works. Those of us who have taken workshops from John, know just what fun and how inspirational this Joline Freund man can be.

Facts About Our Guild

Our first quilt show was in 1989 and was held at the St. Jacobs Community Hall. The co-conveners were Kathy Langill and Joyce Newman. It took place on October 13,14 and 15 as part of the Oktoberfest festivities, for which we paid for inclusion. Admission was \$2.50. Membership at yearend, June 1989, was 103, and a total of 117 quilts were entered. During the previous year, the first raffle quilt was made, a variation on Myrna Allen's "Zygocactus", and the proceeds went to Waterloo YMCA housing program for women and children. Perhaps that was the "when and where" of the unofficial mandate for our raffle proceeds. Remembering our Quilt Guild Beginnings


Pam Sittler and her mother managed "The Sap Bucket", in Elmira, which was a consignment craft shop in 1973. Eventually, it became predominantly a quilt studio until it closed in 1985. One day in 1984, two young women came into the shop with the purpose of inquiring about the prospect of a quilt guild in the area. Uylond Lynch and Mary Lynn McMahon were new to the area and, as sewers, expressed disappointment that Waterloo County did not have a quilt guild. The two women left the store with Pam's promise to actively present the idea of a guild to women who would be interested. She received similar reactions from most women, who felt their projects were private and the idea was scary for them. However the very creative Bearinger sisters, Rita Bearinger, Aleda Stanbury and Mabel Martin were thrilled about the idea.

Twenty women gathered at Uylond Lynch's home in June 1985, including Pam, Mary Lynn McMahon, Aleda Stanbury, Mabel Martin, Laura Anonby, Ruth Charters, Lynne Fisher, Joan Corbett, Cynthia Stapells, Donna Nowe, Judy Schieck, Sandra Black, Joyce Newman, Ida Dietrich, Diane Collins, Ruth Hodgins, Laura Colqhoun, Pearl Payne, Margaret Ehrlich. They came up with two name suggestions for our guild. "Waterloo County Quilters' Guild" was one, but the Bearinger sisters, whose roots were with the early settlers from Pennsylvania, hoped "Trail of the Black Walnut Quilters" would be considered. The name as we know it today, was decided by a majority of only two. The meeting resulted in determining aims, constitution, meeting times, possible locations and leadership needs.

There was tremendous excitement in finding the facility at the Albert McCormick Community Centre with "the perfect railing to hang our quilts"! It was a new facility, and one of their rules was that no boots were allowed in winter, so members had to bring slippers or other footwear to wear in the hall.

Uylond and Mary Lynn lived here only briefly. As it turned out Pam also left the guild to move to Saudi Arabia after a year. But they had left their mark and a legacy. At the end of the first year, there were 73 members.

If you signed up for the eye-spy block exchange in June do the following:


- 1. Cut your 10 fat quarters (of children's prints) into 20 (4"x4") blocks.

Raffle Quilt Tickets - DO YOU KNOW WHERE YOURS ARE?

All raffle tickets **MUST** be turned in at the September guild meeting. This will be in the form of ticket stubs and money, or unsold tickets. If your unsold tickets are lost, or you still plan to sell some before the show please let Judy Cumming know. She will be tracking down all the tickets not returned between the guild meeting and the Quilt Show so any help you can give her would be appreciated.

Quilt Show Take In and Pick Up Procedure

Take In – please drop off your show items between **7:30 & 9:30 am on Thursday, September 24**. They can be dropped off at Forbes Family Hall at RIM Park (second floor at main entrance). If you are not able to meet this timeline please bring your show items to the September guild meeting for a "Quilt Buddy" to help you out.

Pick Up – your quilt show items must be picked up from **6:30 to 7:30 pm on Saturday, September 26**. If you are not able to meet this timeline please arrange for a "Quilt Buddy" to pick up your items (it will be helpful if your "Quilt Buddy" has your paper receipt when claiming your show items).

Recommendations Re the Delivery of your Show Items

- Your Show Item should be individually placed in a pillowcase or other cloth bag. (plastic bags are not suitable for this process). We will accept those items that may come in specialized containers.
- Quilts must be folded with the right side out.
- A permanent inked, sewn or fused label is highly recommended on your show items.
- All bed/lap quilts and wall hangings must have a hanging sleeve (a 4" hanging sleeve is recommended for larger items that may be hung on the white PVC hanging rods – your smaller wall hangings may be threaded on a smaller wooden dowel but they will still need a hanging sleeve).





But we still need the woman power to make it run! Each month we need 4 people each afternoon and evening plus the librarian to get the books displayed, returned, checked out and then packed up and returned to the cupboard. Please consider helping Audrey in the afternoon and Bonnie in the evening.

Now that you can see the newer books more easily, you can select up to 3 books and as many magazines as you wish for a month's time. The fines for overdue books will be turned back into buying books for the library. (Unfortunately, the Zehrs tapes program will longer be giving money to nonprofit organizations. They are focusing on food for kids.)

New Library Books

Fun, Fast Fusies by Frieda Anderson. This book is about art quilting using fusible web that it is fun, fast and easy because this allows you to bypass matching seams of irregular shapes. The author provides designs, 12 of them, inspired from her garden and walks in the woods and encourages you to create your own using her fusing method. The photographs are in good detail which allows you to see the free-motion quilting that she uses.

<u>Blended Quilt Backgrounds-Create Secondary Patterns</u> by Jean Biddick. "A tantalizing new book for traditional block patterns" is how this book is labeled. This is achieved by pattern manipulation and colour placement resulting in secondary designs which appear as blocks that float, blend, and reshape themselves to become an integral part of each quilt's design. She gives 10 quilt projects with easy to follow cutting charts.

AQS Quilt Savvy- Fallert's Guide to Images on Fabric by Caryl Bryer Fallart.


