


Welcome to the Waterloo County Quilters' Guild's September 2020 Virtual Show and Tell

### **Lighthouse Quilt**



### **Sergeant Pepper**




It was quilted by The Red Red Bobbin in Brantford.




# **Disappearing Nine-Patch I Spy Quilt**






This one was a project that was started and ignored due to make masks. It's was needed as a neighbour had their new son this week join their family.

These are three runners from the *Janet Baker* class from last month. The navy blue runner called out for 2 sided binding. Early Christmas presents!








Table Runners using some of the 2 ½" strips from the *Strippers Club*. These would probably go to the boutique at our next quilt exhibit.



I took the course *How to Hex* with *Janet Barker*.




#### **Table Runners**













I made this quilt over the summer.






This wall hanging was made from scraps accumulated while making a multitude of masks! I was using a design for a contoured face mask that required rectangles of a print for the outer side and a white for the lining and then trimming off all four corners. As I was tossing these cut off triangles into the garbage I started to wonder what I could make with them instead of throwing them away. I started by piecing them into 1 3/4" half square triangle units them assembled them into four 7 ½"finished blocks.

With a sleeve added to the back it can be used either as a small wall hanging or as a table topper.

Just a bit of COVID madness!
